## PAUL HOECKE Notes from the road This Month is Creepy Season

January is a good month in my book. With all the holiday hubbub a pleasant but rapidly fading memory, it's when you can refocus on the realities of regular life. In other words, it's the perfect time for getting the year off to a good, clean start.

Mind you, I'm not talking about traditional stuff like New Year's Resolutions. I think resolutions are too constraining and often unrealistic, hence easily shelved almost as soon as they are made. Okay, I admit that I tried going down that route in this column a year ago. But the piece turned out kinda preachy, and I didn't make much of a dent in the list it talked about. So, when people ask me about that nowadays, I just tell them I don't do resolutions, period.

No, as far as I'm concerned, January is not about lists but about mindset. It's about renewal; resetting the life clock, if you will. It's about starting the year refreshed, with an open mind and a forward-looking attitude. I'm told that, ideally, doing so leads to a certain serenity of mind that enables you to handle upcoming challenges in an orderly fashion, regardless of whether these challenges are anticipated or not.

I guess it's an especially useful philosophy to have if you're a car nut with an array of old BMWs which like to be worked on and generally kept happy on a regular basis. But this reliance on a regular routine also becomes a weakness when a seemingly simple task expands way beyond its original parameters to take away time and resources from other projects. What makes this process particularly insidious is that it happens slowly, with excellent reasons for every step in its growth. Worse yet, its glacial progress makes its impact on other projects virtually imperceptible – until it's too late.

Of course, serious wrench twirlers and shade tree mechanics both know this as Mission Creep. It's an old nemesis that has also made this January considerably less serene for me. Here's how.

It all started last summer, when the electric fuel pump on my 1980 730 died. As you may recall, this car is a Euro-only version of the E23 (aka Seven Series) sedan that came with a 4-barrel carburetor instead of fuel injection. For over twenty years, with a Holley replacing the original (and awful) Solex 4-bbl carb, the car has required only a low-pressure Carter fuel pump to run great. So, when the pump developed a leak (after 10 years' service), it looked like a simple matter to replace it with an identical unit. Or so I thought.

Once the new pump arrived from Summit, my son, having volunteered for the job, dove under the hood, undid the in and out fuel lines, unplugged the power wires (plus and ground), and removed four bolts attaching the pump with its bracket to the engine bay's sidewall. He then installed the new pump in the same spot, using new wiring and hardware; and turning on the ignition resulted in the familiar (and highly welcome) buzz indicating a working pump. So far, so good.

Things still looked good when I got behind the wheel to start the car. Obviously, fuel delivery was A-OK because the engine fired up right away and ran fine at idle. It was only when I revved the engine and glanced at the tach to check rpm that I realized something was amiss: The tach's needle hadn't budged! And neither had the ones on the coolant temp and fuel level gauges! Sitting there, I didn't expect the speedometer to register anything, but my aftermarket oil pressure and volt gauges were working. Conclusion: Whatever was wrong was affecting only one specific set of instruments in the cluster.

My next step followed the Occam's Razor principle – first look at the simplest solution. In this case, it meant checking the fuses, which I did right away. Sure enough, two were blown, including the #6 fuse that (according to the Germanlanguage fuse box label) protects the affected gauges. The other blown fuse was harder to explain because, as part of the heater blower circuit, it had no connection to the instrument cluster. No matter: I had the correct replacements for both – old-style ceramic ones – so in they went. But when I checked the gauges (after starting the car), they were as dead as before. Damn!

For a moment, I wondered if the problem was with the flexible circuit board in the instrument cluster. (Years earlier, I'd had to recondition rivets which serve as chassis grounds for the board but had been corroded by sparking caused by a short.) But I decided to postpone removing the cluster and first check all the circuitry serving the cluster, which meant poring over the car's circuit diagram.

You know what it's like to try and read a paper circuit diagram? Even if it measures 2 ft. x 4 ft. (unfolded, of course), it's like looking at spaghetti that's been spilled on a tablecloth. But persevering (with Paul Mele's help) paid off: we confirmed that while #6 fuse was one likely culprit, there are other places where power to the cluster might possibly be interrupted. So, yes, more disassembly would be required.

So, out came the instrument cluster, which eventually allowed me to verify that all printed circuits were good and all bulbs (idiot lights and other indicators) were okay. But that was only the beginning. Next came the custom gauge panel (from what used to be the ashtray location); and the armrest console combo, followed by the tray surrounding the shifter for the automatic tranny, which allowed me to check the condition of the electrical connectors on my list of suspects.

Of course, removing all that trim revealed other items in need of my attention: Air ducts leading to the rear seats that were clogged by chewed upholstery padding left there by former rodent residents; hardware, nuts and bolts missing from several key attachment points; and a first look at a broken switch at the base of the emergency brake handle, which is why the emergency brake indicator light hasn't worked in ages.

I could go on, but I think you get the picture. Almost needless to say, I'll fix all the problems, and perhaps some others too. It will take time, weeks if not months, including time I owe my other Bimmers. I may even get back to the problem that started all this. But as I write this, the biggest irony is that I still don't know if the gauges in the instrument cluster will work when I replace the cluster in the dash. Sheesh!

But that's what mission creep does.

# CLUB RACING REPORT

## Four Tarheel Racers Score Wins at Roebling Road

Hello again, fellow club racing fans, and welcome to the New Year!

This is supposed to be the time when we officially kick off the 2022 Tire Rack BMW CCA Club Racing (CR) season. But don't look for anything about that in this report. For one thing, at press time, there was nothing on the CR calendar until March, which may be enough of an excuse. More importantly, though, we needed to focus on one last piece of unfinished business from last year: The 2020 CR Season Finale at Roebling Road in mid-December. So, here goes.

The event format was familiar from years past. Co-hosted by the Tarheel Chapter and the Vintage Drivers Club of America (VDCA), the schedule called for a 3-day weekend featuring two sprints and an enduro, all that slotted in between a bunch of vintage run groups, and the VDCA regaling everyone with a pig and oyster roast after the long race Saturday night.

In terms of scale, the event was hardly a record breaker, as CR events go. While the entry roster listed some forty-plus registrants representing ten classes, there were never more than thirty-five cars running on the 2-mile, 9-turn track. And with overall speeds averaging less than 90 mph the entire weekend, the races weren't especially fast paced either. What did set the weekend apart, though, was the large Tarheel Chapter presence. It was kinda overwhelming.

Not only did our track warriors account for more than half the field in every race, but they made up most or all of the racers in each of the three largest class groups. As a result, there was a lot of intramural Tarheel Chapter competition, as well as dominant performances by local racers in all but one of the four classes they participated in.

With nine local entries – Phil Antoine, Jeff Breiner, Mark Fishero, Bert Howerton, Harry Meyer, Scott Reavis, Carl Sanders, Tom Tice and Jack Wilkins – the Spec E36 group was entirely homegrown. And the action echoed previous events, with Breiner, Howerton and Wilkins constantly vying for the class lead. This time, however, it was all Wilkins, as he stayed ahead of his two rivals to win the class crown in all three races. Breiner was second in Friday's sprint but finished third in class behind Howerton in the long race and the feature sprint Sunday.

It was also pretty much like that in B-Mod, where four of the six entries were local hot shoes: Alan Davis, John Gardner, Bill Glavin and Jay Golding, all driving F87 M2s. This was the largest number of F87s we've observed on the local racing scene so far; and given the absence of the likes of C-Mod speed kings Charles Harding and Todd Brown, these racers consistently finished at the front of the field. Golding took the overall win in Friday's sprint trailed by Gardner, but Gardner won the class in the other two races with finishes in third and second place overall.

Sailing solo in D-Mod, April Curtis contributed to the Tarheel Chapter tally with victories in the first sprint and (with Mike Hinkley as codriver) the endurance race. Only the five local racers in the ten-entry Spec E46 group – Pete Kamarchik, Rob Likovich, Al Pereida, Jim Sullivan and Mike Utecht – missed doing likewise; their best finishes were third in class by Sullivan in Friday's sprint and by Kamarchik in the feature race on Sunday.

As we've alluded to above, the earliest 2022 CR Season race date we know of at this point is in March, a Peachtree Chapter-hosted race at Road Atlanta. We expect additional dates (including the race at VIR in April) to be confirmed shortly. The same goes for news of any 2021 National or Regional class championships won by our track warriors. So, stay tuned.
